Claire Osborn, Group Education Principal, feels that the latest period of home learning was very successful; "The Oak-Tree Heads and teaching teams created a home learning programme that reflected as closely as

possible the high-quality, personalised learning experience that the children would experience in school.



Not only were they able to access innovative and purposeful live lessons, they continued to create opportunities for children to connect with their friends in form times and provided group work, and personalised experience with one-toone or small group sessions and daily pastoral support. In addition, special initiatives to support pupils and families have included mental health and wellbeing resources, guidance about internet safety and regular contact and wellbeing calls to families.

In addition to the normal learning, we set tasks and themed days including Homemade Soup Day, exercise challenges, raised money for charity, enjoyed the 'Big Bird Watch', took virtual visits to the zoo, produced some exceptional artwork and so much more. Despite all of this, it was being able to everybody back!"

Normanhurst

Year 11 students were given the opportunity to sign up for a ten week online careers mentoring programme run by the STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Maths) Ambassadors and Brightside Mentoring that will run until the end of May 2021.

Pupils in Years 7, 8 and 9 were given a series of four Science Week themed lessons in which they worked collaboratively towards designing an innovation that would help cities in 2050 to better utilise energy sustainably. Following this year's theme and in an attempt to smash stereotypes about scientists, the Year 10 Triple Science students Olivia, Hamza and Malachi all Damon. devised noteworthy presentations about a field of science and scientists whose work inspired them.



The other year groups enjoyed taking part in different experiments during their lessons. All Year 1 pupils entered the Baylab competition and the standard of entries received was extremely high.

Year 1 pupils were awarded their Crest Awards Passport and certificate for completing an amazing ten experiments. Reception children completed various science activities, including exploring what coloured materials they could see the best in the dark and discussed the word 'reflective'. The Junior pupils spent Science Week conducting a huge variety of experiments.



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World **Travels** with Normanhurst's Kindergarten



Normanhurst's Kindergarten children have been travelling around the world! Their travels are based on a story called 'My Granny Went to Market'. In the story, Grandma travels on a 'magic carpet' and the children had fun climbing aboard their own magic carpet and setting off on their journey of discovery. They went to Thailand first and made mango cookies, explored the temples and decorated elephants dressed up in costumes from this part of the world. They even had a go at a still life painting of a beautiful orchid. "Then we headed westwards to the land of Mexico", and just as in the story, Kindergarten made fierce and funny masks. They enjoyed making vegetable wraps, even planting the stone from the avocado to see if it will The children visited rainforest and had a creative session about the chameleon. beautiful country with lots of stories, books and activities. They finished their trip in Europe with France, Spain and Italy. A Spot of Pond Dipping

Pupils at Coopersale Hall enjoy making use of the on-site pond for a range of pond dipping Science activities. This term, Year 2 have been exploring mini habitats - firstly identifying various types of habitat, then exploring the animals that live within. Children have learned how plants and animals

depend on each other to survive.



They completed the unit by exploring the pond habitat in the school grounds, where they looked at the plant life, pond weed and lily pads. The children also enjoyed pond dipping to find out what creatures lived in the water. They found many water louse, pond snails and a number of different nymphs.


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Oak-Tree Artists

We certainly have some budding artists in the Group, with pupils of all age groups producing some wonderful works of art.

This term, Year 2 pupils Normanhurst have worked on some silhouette art, creating some superb contrasting animal shapes. Reception children created their own space and stars images that really were out of this world. Year 3 have been studying work of Lichtenstein, creating a pop art piece themselves and experimenting with different materials. Year 6 continued with their optical art and collages, with pupils working on different animals and completing their collages with whatever was available at home. The results were very impressive!



Year 9 pupils at Braeside have been looking at Surrealist artists in recent weeks. To expand on their ideas, they explored Surrealist collages using remove, shatter and manipulating to create some bizarre compositions.

Year 7 have been exploring a wide range of skills, materials techniques to create clown puppets. Years 3 and 4 have been exploring



Neurographic Art, which is a mindful practice that allows them to draw freeform lines and algorithms to transform stress and fear into a beautiful work of art.

Year 1 children at Coopersale Hall have been producing watercolour still life paintings of spring flowers with some beautiful results. Year 3 were asked to complete their own selfportraits. Using half a photo of themselves, they did a fantastic job



drawing the other half. In their English and Art lessons, Year 4 have enjoyed studying Picasso. They learned about his life and took a look at some of his famous paintings. After learning about portraits in Art, Year 3 were challenged to create their own self-portraits using any materials they could find around the house. There were lots of creative portraits.

Over the last few weeks, children in the Oaklands KS2 Art Club have been designing some scratch art. The children are going to scratch their designs onto old CD discs that they have painted with black paint. This will reveal the colourful, rainbow silver shimmer underneath the paint. We look forward to seeing the finished results! Upper Kindergarten enjoyed making some birthday cards for a special lady's 100th birthday recently.
