The Bugs And The Bees

Most species (90% in the UK) of wasps and bees lead solitary lives.

In spring many species lay eggs in tiny, safe places. Over winter, some bees rear their young so they need winter flowering plants. Others hibernate and need piles of leaves and twigs or an undisturbed compost heap or a bee hotel.

Donald showed off a bee hotel that he built from a kit he received for his birthday. He gave a detailed description of all the stages required to piece it all together. Year 5 are going to take this a bit further and build their own bug and bee hotels to place around the school grounds. Donald's bee hotel has given everyone some ideas on what to include: lots of small holes and crevices into which the bees and bugs can crawl.

Thanks for the inspiration, Donald.








Reception Trip To The Natural History Museum

How Does A Child Develop Creativity Through Art?

Art is important during early development. The visual arts allow children to enter an imaginative world, to be creative and to engage in playful thinking. It also boosts observation, self-esteem and provides a sense of accomplishment.

UKT have been inspired by "Katie and the Sunflower" by James Mayhew, and also "Sunflowers" by Vincent Van Gogh (1853-1890), which he painted using very thick paint and bright colours. Although a famous painting today, during his life time people did not like his paintings because they were so different. The children recreated the sunflowers by folding paper to look like a fan and then sticking it together.

They also made their own still life drawing of Vincent Van Gogh's "Sunflower" using oil pastels and honing their observational skills.











UKF focused on "Only One You" by Linda Kranz where they have explored the importance of appreciating themselves and how their differences make them special... "Only one you....make it a better place. No matter how you look at it there is so much to discover."

The class have created a beautiful and individual shoal of fish. The children definitely were adventurous - tested the water - and dived in to make a wonderful undersea display board. This book reinforces that everyone is individual and can make the world a better place by just being themselves.







UKC considered the value of perseverance when reading "The Little Owl" by Caroline Pitcher. "Little Owl stretched and strained... I will do it too... Yes, I'm last and very small but I will never give up at all... and he flew, and flew, and flew!".

The children created the little owl through collage and also through paint. They worked together to achieve a wonderful parliament of owls.



WOW Day!

Year 1 enjoyed a WOW day to end their Toys topic. The children wrote invitations to invite their teddy bears to come to school, then followed instructions to make sandwiches and cakes for a Teddy Bears' Picnic. They made a traditional cup and ball game from simple materials and played with old fashioned toys such as dominoes, jacks and shut the box, as well as toys from around the world like Russian dolls. Finally, they enjoyed the afternoon sunshine, playing hopscotch, noughts and crosses and of course the age old favourite, a game of tag!

A huge thank you to Mrs Futter and Emily for teaching all the children how to play Jacks. They had a wonderful day!



This is the option for KS1 pupils to get involved. They will enjoy presenting and preparing work to show the class. They will gain a lot from exploring a topic of their choice.

There is also a national poster competition linked to British Science Week, which pupils may also want to enter (details attached). They could use this poster to help with their presentation to the class. Posters submitted will then be judged and 5 will be put forward by the school and entered into the competition.

There will be other science linked activities running during lessons throughout this week. I hope pupils enjoy taking part in this wonderful week of science! C Carter.









Instructions Research your poster

Get the pupils thinking about ideas to include in their poster. They could investigate and imagine 'Connections' and everything that makes them special. Here are some topi ideas to help you get the inspiration started:

- Ask them to think about their personal experiences of connections - from learning about how their body parts are connected. to connecting with their classmates. teachers and family members to help them learn more about science. Has it helped them become stronger, braver, kinder or more accomplished?
- Is the world built on connections? Why ot think about connections in ter of the ancient family tree that connects all animals, how atoms connect or bond to make up our surroundings ar connections in construction. What are examples of good connections?
- examples of good connections?

 Is there someone pupils have connected with who inspired or helped them? It doesn't have to be someone they know, it can be any role model! Why not have them create a portrait that demonstrates this? Connections are everywhere. From the friends we make who share new ideas, to the connection between eco-friendly behaviour and a better future, there is so much to see all around us.

Make your poster

Once the children have done their research it's time to get creative! The poster must be:

- > A4 or A3 size and you need to be able to take a photo of it to send to us online for judging.
- > Pupils can use pop up pictures, pull out tabs or use materials such as paint drawing pencils, crayons and paper

> Posters will be judged on creativity, how well they fit the theme, how well the poster has been made or drawn, and how engaging they are. Once the poster is complete, take a photo and complete the online form with your entry details

Year 1 learn about Antarctica

Year 1 had a fantastic treat with a visit from Mr Taylor, Max's grandad. The children have started a new topic learning all about maps. He told the children about his recent trip to Antarctica and shared the journey he had to take to get there, which had taken many days!

Mr Taylor shared lots of wonderful photographs with the children of all the different animals he had seen, including polar bears, many different types of penguins and even whales! The children asked lots of thoughtful questions - even finding out whether penguins have ears! Mr Taylor provided the children with maps of his travels and even gave each child a photograph to keep.



Children's Mental Health Week

At Coopersale Hall School, we celebrated Children's Mental Health week from 6-12 February. This year's theme was "Let's Connect" and we spent time thinking and learning about the importance of forming positive connections.

We were delighted to welcome Mrs Rose Horgan, a clinical hypnotherapist, into our school assembly on Tuesday 7 February. Mrs Horgan helped the children to explore how they might feel when connecting with people for the first time, why they may feel anxious and different ways in which they can connect with people in a rewarding and positive way. Together, we explored all the positive things that make the children feel connected, including family, friends, hugs, stroking pets, helping people and becoming part of a team.

Then it was time for some role-play, jumping back in time to the Stone Age. Jesse in 2V became a scary bear, terrorising Emilia in 4G, our Stone Age person. However, when Gregor in 5G and Sophie in 1C were selected to become a tribe with Emilia and they all faced the bear together, becoming stronger, and were able to work together and overcome the situation.

The role-play taught the children how human connection can help us in so many different situations and can make us feel stronger. It's important to share our problems with people as they can help us and make us feel better. A problem shared is a problem halved!

The children all engaged well with the assembly and learnt that there are many ways to create and connect with people in positive and nurturing ways.

Following their Mental Health Week assembly, Year 5 and Year 6 each attended a workshop held by Mrs Horgan, thinking about how our brains work, how they cope with stress and exploring strategies to support us when we are under pressure. Together with Mrs Horgan, the children considered the importance of resilience and wellbeing and how our body reacts to stress.
