Year 7 Visit Mountfitchet Castle

On Monday 11 January Year 7 visited Mountfitchet Castle in Stansted. This reconstructed Norman Motte and Bailey castle allowed us to see in real life what we had been studying in class. As we approached the castle we could see the siege tower in position and ready to attack! It was much larger than the textbooks suggested. The dry moat was visible. It could be soaked in oil and set alight to stop an invading army, and was dotted with pointed stakes to damage any horses that made it that far up the hill. As we entered under the portcullis we saw the Great Plague stone. In times of pestilence this was filled with vinegar and newcomers were encouraged to wash their money in the substance to prevent the spread of disease. On entering the village we could see a variety of small dwellings including the blacksmiths, the brewer's hut, the weaver's house and the surgeon's house. They were all pretty basic. It was clear that they did not waste anything. When they killed an animal they used absolutely every part of it. Bones were used for tools, sheep bladders were made into drinking vessels and hides were used for rugs and clothes. What fascinated us the most were the methods of punishment doled out in the medieval times. We saw a ducking stool, a prison, many pillories and stocks, a rack, a St Andrew's cross and a gibbet. We enjoyed trying out some of the simulator activities, trying to aim the catapult at the oncoming attackers and gauging the accuracy of our arrows. Our final stop on the tour was the inner bailey where the Grand Hall and Baron's quarters were. These were more sophisticated than the rest of the buildings and were draped in richer and warmer materials. As well as stepping back into history we got to spend time feeding and stroking the rescue animals including ducks, geese, deer, goats and peacocks.

The Highway Rat got his just desserts in the end





Bancroft's Science Fair










Year 2 Learn About The Titanic

How long have you been performing?

I have been going to the Carmel Thomas Performing Art School for around 2 years now. I go on a Saturday morning from 9am to 1pm. During this time I do many different things from singing, musical theatre, tap, ballet, drama and LAMDA. I have recently moved up in my tap and ballet groups so my timetable has changed around and I am with different people in my classes.



How much do you enjoy doing so many artistic skills?

I really enjoy doing so many different things. At the moment I feel that I will be doing these things for a very long time. I think that it is wonderful to act and learn to become different characters. There are so many other things that benefit you also like how to stand, project my voice, listen to people and it really helps with memory recall – things I think will help me as I get older in many different situations.

Year 4 Create mosaics

In art over the last few weeks, Year 4 have been designing and making their own mosaic pieces. First, the children planned their ideas on to a grid which helped them organise their thoughts with sizes, shape and pattern. Pupils then used MDF as a base similar to the size of a coaster along with PVA to stick tiles on to the base.

The children had a wide variety of different size and coloured mosaic tiles to choose from including glass tiles, ceramic and vitreous tiles. Once the pieces had set, the children used a child friendly grout as an adhesive to fill in the gaps and hold the tiles firmly in place. The children were very careful to wipe off the residue and clean up the individual tiles so that their patterns and images could shine through.

It was a very messy process but everyone worked very hard! The children did a great job from start to finish, working hard to produce their finished result. All of the pieces look stunning in the sunlight and all the children are very pleased with their efforts. Well done Year 4!





Year 6 Bikeability Challenge

This week the Year 6 children all completed the Bikeability challenge and test. There were two separate groups that had two days to show what they could do.

In the morning of the first day, we all had to bring in our bikes (there were some really bright and bold ones, ones with special horns, even ones that were huge compared to others).

Firstly, we had to walk our bikes down to the Astroturf to learn how to mount, steer and how to use the brakes on our bikes. We also learned how to fit our helmets on properly. We cycled around the Astroturf and learned how to ride behind people without crashing. This was a chance to show the instructors that we could go on the road. We then learnt how to safely go in different directions to other people and then forming a snake behind a specific person. The instructors then taught us how to signal to turn, stop and look. After we had lunch, we went on to the roads and were taught about primary and secondary positions so we knew where to go when we turned and cycled.

On the next day, we had a recap of everything and went straight to the roads. We did lots of drills, learning how to turn into and out of junctions. After lunch we were taught about the different road signs and were tested on them. On the way back, we had to cycle up the hill that took us back to school, and as it was steep; it was a hard journey by itself. When we were back in school we all sat down in the courtyard and shared something we learned to earn our badges for completing the Bikeability Challenge.

Well done to everyone in Year 6 who put lots of effort into this challenge and we thank all the teachers who made this possible.
